Flying High the Beloved Selves

Existence in the multiple spheres and their skilful juggling like a clever goddess make a contemporary woman relevant unto herself and to the rest of the world. Anyone who succumbs to the public and private pressures is destined to become stains of tears that she herself would perhaps hate to see. That means a woman in the contemporary world is expected to hold, analyse, understand and act upon her own life instead brooding over the lost chances and bygone opportunities. In such a life whatever she creates becomes an expression of her own freedom as well as a model of freedom that the women around her could emulate. Looking at the present body of works by Renuka Sondhi Gulati, as an art critic, who has written on her works earlier as well, I could definitely say that she has left behind the early scepticism about her own divided existence as a public artist and a private person and has become a person who has successfully fused the public and private selves into one. In these works one could see the vigorous negotiations between spaces, a critique on the technological and emotional submission of women by the socio-economic forces, the external spaces of self assertion and the internal spaces of contemplation and reconciliation.

While Renuka as an artist employs the image of an eagle as a symbol of feminine freedom, ambition and ability to fly high, she very skillfully brings forth her own self as well as a surrogate self and attributes them with a sort of iconic nature. Like Lord Vishnu who sleeps horizontally on the serpent of Time in the ocean of wisdom, here in Renuka's works the central female protagonist is seen in a horizontal position as if she were in the process of creation and in the creative slumber as the male Gods do. The same mythological concept comes to the fore when she uses her sculptural family unit complete with an umbilical code running up with a foetal figure in the divine sleep. This myth of genesis or the myth of creation that we see in Indian mythologies (the way Brahma comes out of the lotus sprouting from the sleeping Vishnu's navel) is aesthetically carried over to the sculptures by the artist. To prove this point, we have another sculpture from her in which the female protagonist is seen lying horizontally in her creative slumber.

Coming back to the eagle imagery, we could say that eagle is a bird that could soar high up in the sky and also see its preys down. Eagles do prey as they float in the air but there are times they simply move like idle beings and in the very

floatation itself they find their happiness. Here in Renuka's paintings we see an eagle as the paraphrasing of the artistic self and interestingly one of the works where we find the eagle imagery quite dominant is titled 'Let Me be Free'. 'Soaring High Through Her Vision' is another work where the presence of a neck scarf worn by young executives in the job sector makes the newer roles of women in the contemporary society. Perhaps they are tied down by the noose around their necks as the jobs demand but they have all the freedom to fly high using their newly found economic and social freedom. But at the same time Renuka provokes the viewers by bringing her self portrait in one of the works, morphing her likeness as a part of one of those electronic devices like memory stick or a part of the computer's circuit board. Here the protagonist is seen with a pair of headphones over her ears, almost blocking the other voices of the world. But her face is soft and thoughtful. In the title of the work she declares that she is not a machine ('I am not a Machine').

While the female protagonist is capable of declaring her freedom to the world and soar high with her own energy, agency and might, she sees and almost sympathizes with those women who despite having good jobs and pay checks, are forced to live a submissive life under the yoke of patriarchy or its social set up called marriage. Look at the work titled 'The Silent Submission'. The anthropomorphic imagery has some kind of an ironic indication. Though the head of this figure is that of a contemporary girl with a scarf around her neck her body is that of a goat. Renuka is playing upon the adage, 'Bali ka Bakra', the sacrificial lamb. She is fattened for the marriage market. At the same time, there is a slight critique forwarded by the artist as she indirectly suggests the form of Kamadhenu, the female divine being with cow's body and human head. She are divine and powerful. But when she is brought to this world she becomes absolutely powerless. Renuka indirectly suggests that such a situation cannot be allowed for long.

The two works that almost appear as the manifesto of the artist are titled 'In My Dreams' and 'The Roots of My Country'. As I mentioned elsewhere, the protagonists are in a creative slumber. In the former work, the female protagonist is on a happy structure which no longer has the pain of the bed of arrows as experienced by Bheeshma in Mahabharata. Sleeping among the clouds, like

the Lake District Poet, she sees the vision of creations with eyes closed. The same contentment and happy face we witness in the latter work where the woman is seen sleeping under a Banyan tree, the tree of enlightenment. What makes this work interestingly intriguing and specifically bold is the artist's daring to make her protagonist sleep under the Banyan tree, snatching the right to enlightenment from the male hands and also daring to sleep under a tree like a mendicant devoid of the fear of theft or molestation. It is a sort of reclaiming the spaces for herself and for all the women in the world.

'Waiting 'and 'Seeing Beyond' are two paintings that make the artist a bit existential. In 'Waiting' we see the protagonist among a series of painterly images including the hands of different colours are clasped together. There is a sense of apprehension in it. This is a moment of 'to be or not to be'. However, when we see the other works, we understand that such trepidations are easily dispelled in the other works. In 'Seeing Beyond', perhaps for a change and to transcend the gender specifications, Renuka brings the face of a male with eyes closed and covered over with palms. He too is seeing something beyond his closed eyes and I am sure it must be a world where genders are not a problem to be discriminated against, but celebrated. Renuka believes in the family establishment and also the role of the masculine protagonist within the domestic sphere. Such conformism however does not nullify her thematic enthusiasm in the paintings. In her sculptural ensemble the alpha male becomes the protagonist while the rest come under his benevolent protection. I would prefer not to see it as a contradiction but a living reality which is not really in conflict with the artistic personality of the artist. If she could manage both with care and verve, there shouldn't be a place for complaints by others.

Taking a cue from the changing times and the moods of the country, Renuka has emphasized her love for the mother land. According to the artist, the empowerment of the country has a lot to do with the empowerment of women and she is ready to go by the present day mainstream discourse of patriotism and she does find it as a morale booster for the artist in her. In the sculptures, she emphasizes in the ideological apparatuses like family and society and to conform with the given. She affirms her indebtedness to her country and family and celebrates it in her works uncritically. Onlookers could resort to the

poetic understanding of her works through willing suspension of disbelief. And Renuka Sondhi Gulati is an artist of our times who would stand for the country and family, come whatever may.



















